If you have not already done so, please make sure you book an appointment at our Parent's Evening which is at the end of this term to find out how your child has settled into their new year group and about the progress they have made.



Black History Month

This week we have celebrated the start of Black History Month by having an amazing visitor from Wise Moves in and deliver sessions to each key stage.

For FS, Year 1 and Year 2 they had a story telling session. The stories were old traditional tales told from Africa and the Caribbean. The children really enjoyed listening to these stories and at the end of the session they danced to carnival music.

Year 3 and 4 learned about the hidden history of the Georgians. They explored individuals in their roles in society, some examples being a sailor and a seamstress. We also experienced some traditional Georgian dancing which was insightful and fun!

Year 5 and 6 children participated in a workshop showcasing hidden black figures throughout history. We learnt about people like Francis Barber, who contributed to the making of the dictionary and was eventually recognized for his work. The children were transported back to the Georgian era and performed a dance written to music by Ignatius Sancho, the first black composer.

Safeguarding – Identifying Online Risks

Online safety is embedded within the curriculum and children are regularly taught how to stay safe online and how to identify online risks. To help at home, you can help children to identify and manage risks by discussing:

the ways in which someone may put themselves at risk online risks posed by another person's online behaviour

when risk taking can be positive and negative

online reputation and the positive and negative aspects of an online digital footprint

sharing information online and how to make a judgement about when and how to share and who to share with

the risks of cyber crime, online fraud and identity theft

Internet Matters have put some guidance for parents together which includes the terminology, a guide to some of the more popular software tools and also an interactive guide. You can access these resources <u>HERE</u>. SWGfL have also created a new AI hub for schools with useful information which you can access <u>HERE</u>. AI can be amazing but as with everything else there are negatives too. Already, the world is seeing some significant and concerning negatives from image-based abuse to voice scams where a persons voice is cloned using AI. Some research suggests that you only need 3 seconds of a persons voice to clone it. Imagine a child who posts videos on YouTube and the data that this holds. Legislation and technical tools to combat these issues will take a long time and therefore education is always the best form of prevention.
